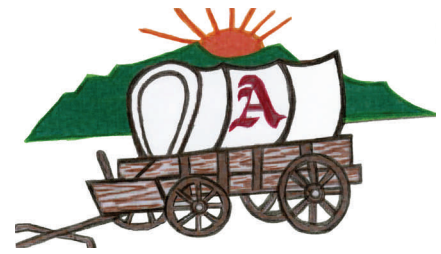

A Body in Motion

There are enough laws written to fill a million courthouses: “Don’t do this. Don’t ride there. Don’t do that...” But there are certain laws that a good rider knows should never be violated. These laws are: Friction, momentum, Centrifugal Force, and Gravity. A rider won’t get a ticket for breaking these laws, but they will end up in a ditch.

Friction, or traction, is the one that keeps you stuck to the road. The first step in maintaining traction is a good set of tires with proper inflation. If the pressure is too low or high, the tire will start to lose traction. A bike with poor traction will start to go sideways in a curve, take longer to stop, and tend to swerve during a hard braking maneuver. Sounds like some kind of a carnival ride, doesn’t it?

When you’re approaching a curve, is your speed low enough coming in? How far can you see into the curve? Is there gravel on the road of a stopped car just around the bend? Is there some dope coming toward you, passing or hanging over the yellow line? Does the curve get tighter halfway through? Is it an older road that is not banked, or worse yet, banked the wrong way? Hit your brakes in there, and it’s adios traction and hello centrifugal force! If you need to brake hard in a curve, you need to brake through it in a straight line. If you must brake hard, and your rear wheel locks up, LEAVE IT LOCKED! If you release a skidding rear tire, you will create a severe change of balance, which will cause a sudden loss of control, and a high-side crash. This will flip you off the bike, and wherever you land, your bike will land there a moment later.

When on slippery roads, anything that changes the smooth flow of your forward momentum can cause the bike to head off in a direction you did not intend. Easy acceleration and smooth steering are necessary here.

Braking is negative acceleration, and acceleration is the square of your velocity. If you double your speed, you’ll need almost four times the distance to stop. Triple your speed, and you’ll need almost NINE TIMES the braking distance. Following distance is like money; you’ll never have too much, but if you have a little less than you need, you’re in trouble.

Isaac Newton said it first, “Gravity Sucks!” Respect the laws of Physics, and you will go a long way toward keeping the shiny side up.

What you always wanted to know about Bisbee AZ and were afraid to ASK.

This Old West mining camp proved to be one of the richest mineral sites in the world, producing nearly three million ounces of gold and more than eight billion pounds of copper, not to mention the silver, lead and zinc that came from these rich Mule Mountains. By the early 1900s, the Bisbee community was the largest city between St. Louis and San Francisco.

It had a population of 20,000 people and had become the most cultured city in the Southwest. Despite its culture, however, the rough edges of the mining camps could be found in notorious Brewery Gulch, with its saloons and shady ladies. In 1908 a fire ravaged most of Bisbee's commercial district along Main Street, leaving nothing but a pile of ashes.

Reconstruction began immediately and by 1910 most of the district had been rebuilt and remains completely intact today. Activities began to slow as the mines played out and the population began to shrink; mining operations on a large scale became unprofitable in 1975.

Bisbee has since evolved into an attractive artist colony and retirement community emphasizing monthly special events and tourism. Travelers from all over the world come to Bisbee to savor its unique charm ... an uncommon blend of creativity, friendliness, style, romance and adventure — all wrapped in the splendor of the Old West.

To stop in Bisbee is to stop in time. Nestled in the mile-high Mule Mountains of southern Arizona, Bisbee has maintained an Old World charm seldom found anywhere in the United States.

The fine collection of well-preserved turn of the century Victorian structures are full of old west history and copper mining lore. Old miners' boarding houses have been refurbished into many charming small bed and breakfast establishments, of which no two are alike.

A popular activity is Bisbee's excellent self-guided fully illustrated walking tour (visit the Chamber of Commerce office to pick up your free copy). The tour details each historic structure and guides the visitor with a map. Included in the walking tour is world famous Brewery Gulch, which in its heyday boasted upwards of 47 saloons and was considered the "liveliest spot between El Paso and San Francisco."

You will also want to visit:

Copper Queen Library: One of Arizona's oldest libraries that began in a corner grocery store, it has become a prominent and accessible institution.

Queen Mine Tour: Tours leave from the Queen Mine Tour Building located immediately south of Old Bisbee's business district.

Bisbee Restoration Association: Free museum housed in the Fair Store building located on Bisbee's historic Main Street.

Arizona Cactus & Succulent Research: The home of an extensive botanical garden containing representative samples of over 800 varieties of high desert plant life including threatened and endangered plants. Serving as a giant outdoor classroom to schools, tourists and residents alike, guided tours are available at all times.

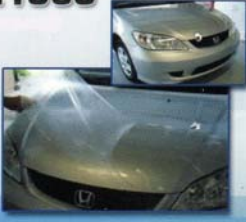
