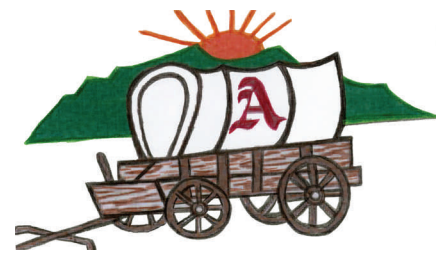

PROPER RIDING APPAREL

How do we explain proper riding apparel? Do you need it to protect yourself in case of an accident or are there other uses? Most of the time during the discussion of the use of proper riding apparel, it is stated that it is necessary to save you from bodily harm in case of an accident.

That may be true but the majority of the time, proper riding apparel is protecting you from the surrounding elements.

Your helmet protects you from hot, cold, hail, rocks, bugs, rain, and any other object that might be flying around your head.

Good eye protection is necessary to keep things out of your eyes. You don't need to be riding blind with a foreign object in one of your eyes.

A good durable long sleeve shirt or coat will protect you from the same items plus slow down the rate of dehydration that occurs when air flows over your skin if left unprotected.

Long pants or leg coverings will also help protect you from scraping your legs on rough objects or burning them on a hot exhaust pipe.

Good sturdy over the ankle shoes will protect you from bumps and bruises. Taller boots will help protect you from severe heat and cold from the wind blowing up your pant leg.

Good fitting full finger gloves will help protect you from the elements and still allow for a good feel of your controls.

To me, good riding apparel is protecting me all of the time from all of the elements that surround us when we are riding.

Rarely are we faced with results of an accident.

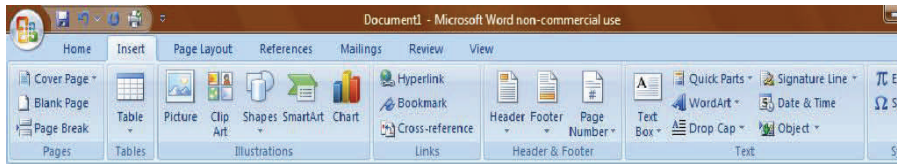
This month is: Adding Page Numbers in MS WORD 2007

So, when was the last time someone asked you to print off and read something that had many pages. Just when you were getting ready sit down and read it, OOPS, you drop the document. If there were no page numbers, what would you do? How would you get back in to some semblance of reading order? When we create documents in MS Word (or in Publisher or any word processing application) it is important to remember at least the most basic of rules for document readability ... Add page numbers to your document. Page numbers can be created in most Microsoft products the same way and if you have been working with these products for a while you are probably very used to how they work and where your tools are. However, in Word 2007 the tool bar has changed. While it is not difficult, navigating around this new application is sometimes frustrating when dealing with a new screen layout.

To add page numbers to your document in MS Word 2007 – do the following steps:

Open a new document

From your menu bar, click on INSERT



Click on Page Number

Click on where you'd like the page number to appear.

Remember to always use page numbers when you create documents with more than one page. Be kind to your readers!

Chapter A is planning a Memorial Day weekend(See Calendar) getaway to Glenwood NM. The following is a brief history of the area,

From 1747 when Spanish explorers discovered Indians farming in the verdant valley until today, visitors have enjoyed the quiet beauty of the San Francisco River country. Glenwood with its quaint shops, motels, and restaurants, is the center of this valley in West Central New Mexico.

The village of 300 people is 65 miles northwest of Silver City on US 180, and is 39 miles south of Reserve. The first house was built there in 1878 when this spot was called the Bush Ranch. Later, it was named White Water for the creek that runs through it. As a stage stop, it was called Glenwood Springs. The name of Glenwood was bestowed in 1901.

New Mexico's first powered airplane flight took place in 1909 near Glenwood. The owner of the stage stop built a plane which landed on what is now called Whitewater Mesa.

At 4,700 feet, Glenwood looks up to the Mogollon Mountains to the east. Mining in the mountains has always affected Glenwood. **One of the biggest tourist attractions today is the Catwalk in beautiful Whitewater Canyon.** A mere five paved miles from the village, this historic remnant of the short-lived mining town of Graham records 29,000 visitors a year, either using the trail or the picnic area at the mouth of the canyon.

Cooney's Tomb is also visited by the curious, who drive seven miles north of Glenwood to the southern outskirts of Alma, turn right on a dirt road and five miles later see a huge boulder smack-dab beside the road. Inside is sealed the body of James C. Cooney who discovered gold ore in the Mogollons in the 1870's, and was killed on this spot in 1880 by Apaches.

In the mountains, about 15 miles from Glenwood, is the old mining town of Mogollon. From here, roads lead into the heart of the Gila National Forest.

Glenwood has been called a sportsman's paradise. The Glenwood State Trout Hatchery is located a short distance from the center of the village. Picnic tables and an obliging staff make this an interesting stop for children. Birders should be on the watch for great blue heron. Also in the area are Rocky Mountain big horn sheep, mule deer, and elk.

At the end of a day in the pristine outdoors, birders, hunters, fishermen, hikers, and just plain sight-seers can relax and enjoy food and lodging in Glenwood's welcoming motels and restaurants.


The Whitewater Motel in Glenwood is the preferred motel to stay. Their phone number is 575-539-2581. Make your reservations early because they only have 10 rooms.



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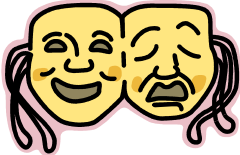
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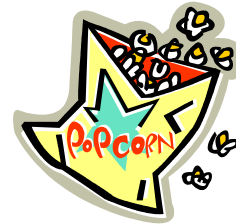
