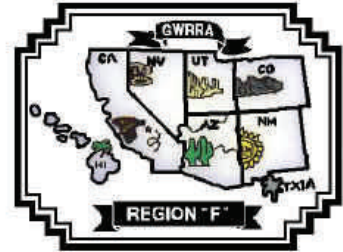

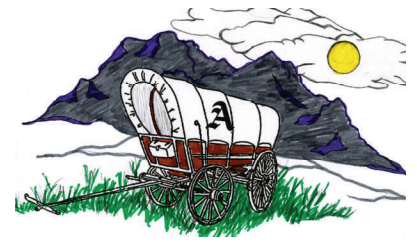

Getting into Focus

As motorcyclists, we don't need the results of a high-priced 'scientific' study to confirm what we already know. A cage driver speeding down the road with a cell phone stuck in his or her ear is had news for our health and well being! A driver's attention, which should be directed to the dynamic events occurring all around him, is suddenly focused on setting up a date for the evening, arguing with a partner, or any number of other meaningless things that can be done with a phone as one speeds down the road. The fact that the driver is using a hands-free device doesn't much lessen his or her in-attentiveness to their driving.

Safely operating a motorcycle on any road at any time is a complex task in itself. Beware, the motorcyclist that has 17 different switches, buttons, and toggles to control the CD player, AM-FM or CB radio, each complete with bass and treble adjustment, left and right, fore and aft speaker balance and heaven forbid—using a Bluetooth to access a telephone while riding! Hopeful you get the idea of a distracted rider.

I See Them—Why Can't They See Me?

Inattention blindness may be a major factor in intersection collisions involving cars and motorcycles. Never heard the term before? It's about time that you became familiar with it because it's important to your survival. Marc Green, a human factors expert and author of "Inattention Blindness & Conspicuity," suggests that this condition and its catastrophic results are more prevalent than imagined. Think of it as looking, but not seeing.

According to Green, there are four factors that affect inattention blindness. The one factor you can have some impact on (no pun intended) is conspicuity. Riding gear that contrasts with the background 'noise' offers you the best chance of being noticed by other road users. Hi Vis (for daylight) vests with retroreflective material (for night) should do the job. Retroreflective stickers on saddlebags, fork legs, rear fender, even your helmet, will also improve your conspicuity to others at night. Green also points out that lights that flicker are more likely to be noticed. Modulating headlights and stoplights do just that.

It's your responsibility to make certain that you stand out and are noticed. The left turning driver can't hear you coming, so loud pipes aren't an option, but being seen is.

Control Issues

Frequently, a lack of precision control can easily be traced to a lack of "precision fit" between rider and motorcycle. Riders often choose a motorcycle because of the "cool" factor, they need to feel part of a group, overwhelming peer pressure, or to make a statement. Important reasons, to be sure, but certainly not at the expense of control.

When we see students having issues with control, it's not because they can't comprehend the technique—physically they're unable to maneuver their motorcycle with precision due to "poor fit." Simply put, the controls are difficult to reach and operate, thus causing poor riding technique.

In a perfect world, control, fit, and comfort should not take a back-seat to "cool." But if you can't comfortably reach the controls, precision will always be a challenge.

- Allen wrench set
- Box wrenches
- Bulbs
- Chain lube—Harley
- Cotter pins—Harley
- Crescent wrench
- Duct tape—Harley
- Flashlight
- Four to six feet of baling wire—Harley
- Impact driver—Harley
- Jumper cables—Harley
- Master link—Harley

- Nuts and bolts—Harley
- Pipe as extension and stand—Harley
- Pocket screwdriver
- Ratchet and appropriate sockets
- Six feet of electrical wire—Harley
- Small container of oil—Definitely Harley
- Small locking pliers
- Spare fuses
- Spark plugs
- Tire repair kit(s) with inflator
- Tire sealant
- Tow strap—Harley
- Waterless hand cleaner—Harley
- Wire cutters
